WE SMASHED IT!

We can't get enough of UK drama right now. We've lapped up *Luther*, cheered on *Scott & Bailey* and been terrorised by *The Shadow Line*. As another firm favourite, *Law & Order: UK*, returns, it only seems right that its star, **Freema Agyeman**, should fly the flag for the Best of British

Freema Agyeman knows a bit about great British TV. Since the 32-year-old from London aced it as Martha Jones, assistant to David Tennant in *Doctor Who* in 2007, she's had her pick of the home-grown dramas.

She battled in BBC1's post-apocalyptic *Survivors*, then made the part of savvy Junior Crown

Prosecutor Alesha Phillips her own in ITV1's *Law & Order: UK*.

With over five million viewers last time around, the drama is back, with Dominic Rowan and former *Doctor Who* star Peter Davison. The format's the same, though: the cops catch the crims, the prosecutors do the prosecuting and we wash down all the action from the safety of our sofas.

So, with *Law & Order: UK* leading a line-up of brilliant home-grown shows on TV, who better to talk about the rise of British drama than one of its biggest stars?

For years, everyone's raved about US dramas like *The Sopranos* and *The Wire*. Are we starting to match them? I think so. The US will always be able to put out more shows than us because of the

size of their country but I think UK drama is doing brilliantly now. I must be honest, I never watched *The Sopranos*. The US TV shows I was hooked on in the Nineties were *Law & Order* and *Quantum Leap*. So I'm thrilled our version has done so well.

What has our *Law & Order* got that the US series hasn't?

To answer that, you've got to see a thing on YouTube called *Law & Order: UK – Lessons In British Justice*. It's this three-minute compilation of clips from our show that brilliantly takes the mickey out of us. It uses the guy who does the voiceover at the start of the US show and he goes on about how in British Law we love dropping things heavily on tables, stopping for tea and wearing multi-coloured scarves. It ends by saying: "It's like our *Law & Order* – just more British."

When was the last time you saw David Tennant and John Barrowman?

My goodness, it's been a long time. John's been filming *Torchwood* in America. David was texting me around the time my niece was born and his daughter was born, and of course because [David's partner] Georgia Moffett is Peter Davison's daughter, I hear all their news through him.

Can you tell us something we don't know about John Barrowman?

I'm pretty sure everyone knows every intimate detail of John Barrowman! When we were rehearsing for *Torchwood*, he had no problem doing scenes with parts of his genitalia on display. By that point, everyone else on the show was used to it so they just carried on like nothing was happening, but I was dying. I didn't know where to look or what to say. But by the time I'd done three episodes, I was practically encouraging him to get Little John out to play!

What mementos of Martha have you kept from *Doctor Who*?

My favourite things – which are mounted on my bedroom wall at home – are from the Daleks episode set in 1930s New York. There were these posters of fictional plays and musicals on the walls of the showgirls' dressing rooms. The prop guy very kindly gave me about eight of them. I love the fact that I'm the only person who has them. I've also got a Dalek alarm clock and a big Dalek on top of my wardrobe.

Do you own a Martha Jones doll?

I've got one 12-inch Martha Jones doll and two figurines. That was so weird and exciting. Having a doll made of me

wasn't on my list of things to do before I die, but I was really chuffed about it. Martha sits on the dresser in my bedroom.

When did you last see Elisabeth Sladen (the Doctor's companion Sarah Jane Smith) before she died?

I was shocked to the core when I heard [she died of cancer in April]. The last time I saw her was at Doctor Who producer Phil Collinson's 40th birthday party in Leeds. I don't know whether she was poorly then, but she looked fantastic. I remember saying to her: "How is it that every time I see you, you seem to get more beautiful?" We were going to appear in an episode of The Sarah Jane Adventures together but then we couldn't because of schedules. I really wish I had done.

Is there any chance Martha Jones could reappear in Doctor Who or Torchwood?

Noel Clarke and I were both meant to be in Torchwood but it just didn't happen. I'd love to have done more as Martha but sometimes you get to a crossroads and have to make decisions about other work. I'd always been a big fan of Law & Order so the chance to do a UK series was very exciting. It has turned into a three-year job, which is longer than I was on Doctor Who, so I don't regret it. But Lis Sladen was a wonderful example of how you can come back to Doctor Who many years later and still be a popular character and be appreciated. So I'd never say never. But if Martha does return, I hope she'd be totally over the Doctor. Her pining for him was wearing a bit thin!

How do you keep fit and toned?

I do find I have to train a lot harder now I'm in my 30s. I bought a cross-trainer when I was doing Doctor Who, which

everyone told me I'd end up just using as a clothes horse but I did half an hour on it every day. That was enough back then but now I think my body's got used to it so I'm having to mix it up. I've started swimming and bike-riding. But what I'd really like to do is dance more. I don't mean on Strictly Come Dancing, though. I'd want to do it in the privacy of my own home or a studio where I wouldn't be judged.

Where are you living now?

I'm in Southgate, North London, but my boyfriend [Holby actor Luke Roberts] is in Hertfordshire, which is where I spend a lot of my time. It's funny because I seek the solace of the countryside now. I love going on lovely long walks and the people there are really friendly. It's good for the soul. He's always been quite a mellow person while I haven't, but now the country air is getting to me. I think rather than just moving in with him, we'll look at getting a new place together in the same area.

Martha memorably saved the universe. Have you ever saved anyone's life?

No, but I had my life saved by Jamie Bamber while filming the previous series of Law & Order. There was this big steel cabinet filled with books behind me and I was talking away when this look of horror came over Jamie's face and he screamed my name. I thought there must be an axe murderer behind me or something, so I ran. The next second this whole cabinet crashed onto my desk, missing me by an inch. I'm not being melodramatic – it would have crushed me. I turned to Bamber and said: "I will never stop building a shrine to you." ▶▶

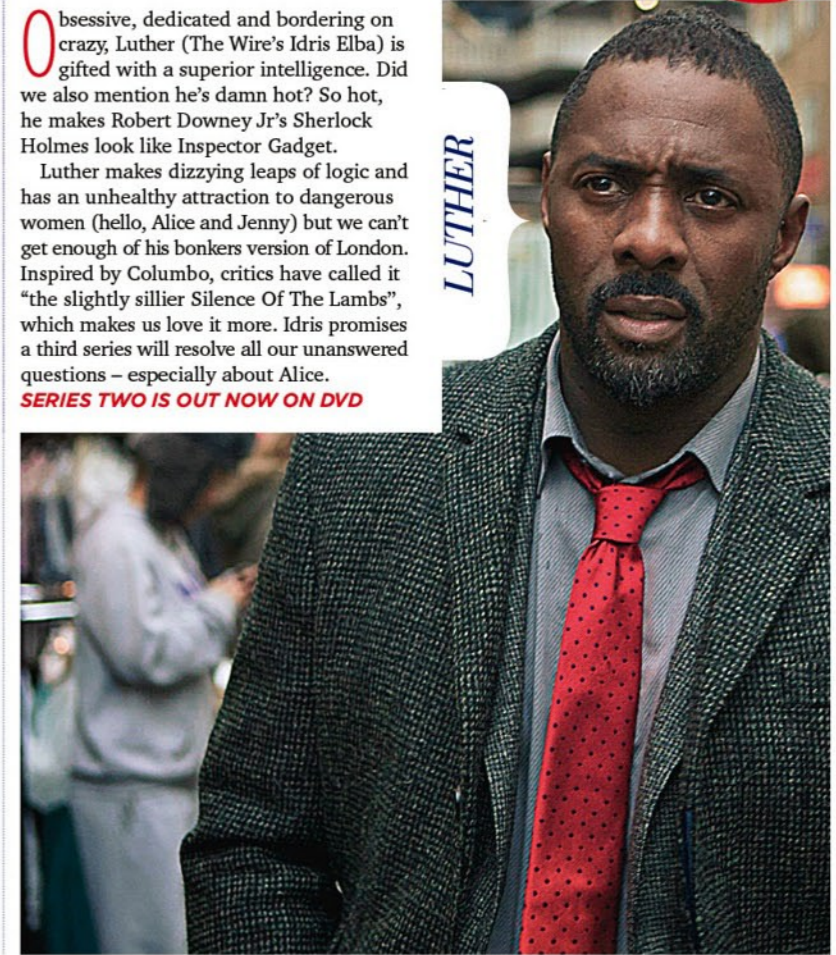
